## Veterinary checks on products entering the Community from third countries

1996/0109(CNS) - 27/06/1997 - Modified legislative proposal

The European Commission amended its proposal in the light of the European Parliament's opinion. The amendments seek to: - clarify the text; - provide a more flexible approach to sanctions; - provide for Article 100A of the Treaty to be used as the legal basis rather than Article 43.

## Veterinary checks on products entering the Community from third countries

1996/0109(CNS) - 18/12/1997 - Final act

OBJECTIVE: to lay down common principles governing the organization of veterinary checks and the movement within the Community of products of animal origin from third countries. COMMUNITY MEASURE: Council Directive 97/78/EC. CONTENT: the directive lays down common rules governing the veterinary controls to be carried out by Member States on products of animal and origin and crop products entering the Community from third countries. It seeks to prevent the spread of contagious diseases by harmonizing the measures needed to protect the health of persons and animals and regulate the problem of the measures to be taken in the event that findings are made during controls. ENTRY INTO FORCE: 19 February 1998 DEADLINE FOR TRANSPOSITION: 1 July 1999.

## Veterinary checks on products entering the Community from third countries

1996/0109(CNS) - 19/02/1997 - Text adopted by Parliament, 1st reading/single reading

In adopting the report by Mr Karl-Erik OLSSON (ELDR, S) Parliament amended the Commission proposal simplifying the procedures for veterinary checks on imports of animals from third countries. It called for the proposal to be based on Article 100a (internal market) and Article 189b of the EC Treaty (codecision procedure) rather than Article 43 of the EC Treaty (agriculture, consultation procedure). The report required that on entry into the Community, products conforming to Community standards and those which do not are to be stored in separate places and marked accordingly. Also, physical checks carried out exceptionally where there may be a risk to public or animal health, or when irregularities are suspected, may take place at an approved border inspection post on each occasion. Parliament also called for the Commission to be assisted by the standing veterinary committee set up by Council Decision 68/361/EEC and for the committee to meet as a rule in public, unless a specific decision is taken to the contrary. Lastly, the report proposed that the new system should be put in place from 1 January 1998 rather than 1 January 1997 to allow Member States to adapt their information system.

## Veterinary checks on products entering the Community from third countries

1996/0109(CNS) - 20/05/1996 - Legislative proposal

OBJECTIVE: the proposal for a Council directive aims to lay down common principles governing the organisation of veterinary checks and the movement within the Community of products of animal origin from third countries. CONTENT: since the entry into force of Directive 90/675/EEC, experience has been gained and developments have taken place with regard to its implementation which, together with reasons of transparency, make the following modifications necessary: - for all products of animal origin imported from third countries, a single checking regime should be applied and all unnecessary provisions concerning bilateral agreements should be abolished; - in the new system of veterinary checks, the separate identity check should be abolished since only a documentary and a physical check need to be carried out; - for products arriving at the Community border without having the Community as a final destination, strict rules must ensure that these products leave the Community; - measures need to be laid down for consignments which have been brought into the Community without being presented for veterinary checks and for the re-entry of Community consignments refused by a third country.

## Veterinary checks on products entering the Community from third countries

1996/0109(CNS) - 27/11/1996

Whilst welcoming the Commission proposal, the Committee feels that, without explicitly referring to customs rules, the directive should clearly state the responsibilities of customs and the relationship between their activities and those of veterinary authorities. The ESC also feels that the directive should expressly require cooperation between the two authorities and that exclusive responsibility for the supervision of free zones, free warehouses and customs warehouses be assigned to the relevant customs authorities rather than to the veterinary authorities, as envisaged in the proposal. The Committee calls for the rapid consolidation of the existing rules, in the interests of clarity and comprehensibility.
